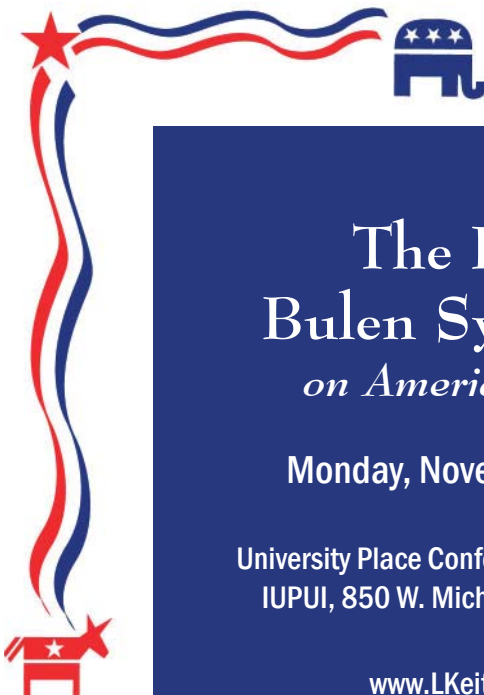

The 2008 election season has been memorable for several reasons. A woman emerged as a serious presidential contender during the primaries and another was chosen as a vice-presidential candidate. How much or how little does the gender, race, or religion of a candidate matter? This Bulen Symposium explores the relevance of these categories for electoral politics.
